When cremation is chosen, it ordinarily follows the funeral mass.

50 days of feasting

e often think of Easter as one Sunday, but in truth it is a season of FIFTY DAYS! For fifty days the Church rejoices in the ultimate good news:

JESUS IS RISEN FROM THE DEAD! WE DIE NO MORE.

Within the fifty days there are special moments to focus the season. Easter Sunday is followed by its own "octave." The Easter octave is a period of eight days following Easter Sunday. Each day of the octave holds the rank of a solemnity in the church calendar.

The Easter season is also marked by two other solemn feasts: the Ascension of the Lord and Pentecost. The Ascension reminds us that not only did Jesus walk the journey of our lives here on earth, but he also leads our way into the future. As the opening prayer for the Ascension states: "May we follow him into the new creation, for his ascension is our glory and our hope."

Pentecost occurs fifty days after Easter, and it signals the end of the Easter Season. Pentecost was originally a Jewish feast day which occurred fifty days after Passover, commemorating the arrival of the Jewish people at Mt. Sinai where Moses received the ten commandments. The first Christians who were Jews gathered for the celebration of Pentecost, and like their ancestors, they received a gift from God, the gift of the Spirit. As Eucharistic Prayer IV puts it so beautifully, "(Jesus) sent the Holy Spirit...as his first gift to those who believe, to complete his work on earth and bring us the fullness of grace."

Sights, Sounds and Smells of Easter time

The fifty days of Easter are joyful days. During this time, our senses are called to rejoice. We hear again the sounds of the Gloria and the Alleluia which have been omitted for all of Lent. St. Augustine says that we are an Easter people and alleluia is our song. The term alleluia is difficult to translate; it is more like a sound than a word. It is an expression of joy, a cheer, which expresses a feeling of jubilation from way down deep. Songs and acclamations of the Easter season are often filled with "alleluias."

Visibly, the color of the vestments and other liturgical appointments are gold or white. An item of great significance during this season is the Easter candle. Each year, the church blesses a new Easter candle at the Easter Vigil service of light. This large candle is to be kept near the ambo for the entire fifty days so that it will be easy to see by the entire assembly. It should be lit for every Mass during the season of Easter. The lit candle is a powerful sign of the risen Christ's presence among us: "a pillar of fire that glows to the honor of God" (The *Exsultet* at the Easter Vigil). It is the light that shatters the darkness and

leads us on the way to salvation. After Easter, it is placed by the baptismal font and lit for baptisms and funerals. Of course, the church is filled with the fragrance of flowers, replaced as needed throughout the entire fifty days to remind us that Easter is a season, not just a day. Incense is often used at Mass during this time especially on Easter Sunday and Pentecost adding reverence and a feeling of prayer that invades all of the senses.

Signs of the Season

As with Christmas, many of the symbols associated with Easter have become secularized and often lose their religious meaning. In fact, one may be surprised to learn that such things as Easter eggs, Easter baskets and even rabbits have deeper meaning for this season. The baby chick breaking its way out of the egg has been seen as a reminder of Christ's emergence from the tomb. The prolific rabbits are a springtime reminder of life in abundance. The Easter basket, today filled with candy, once contained the Easter meal which was brought to church for a blessing. Recall that in past times, no meat was eaten for all of Lent and people fasted more extensively, so the Easter basket was a joyful sign of the end of a forty day fast. Perhaps we could also add the sight of joyful children running in search of hidden eggs or Easter baskets as a reminder of that first Easter race, when Peter and the beloved disciple ran with hope to the tomb, saw it empty and believed.



The developers continue their planning process as we await the full implantation of the Buy/Sell agreement executed on November 9, 2023 with ROLAND, LLC, for the sale of the western portion of our property. This includes a portion of the West side parking lot. Access to this development project

will be from Eaton street on the Southern side of church property. This "access easement" agreement, including its location, is expected to be executed soon. The buyer is engaged with the City of Missoula for the required "Boundary Change" between the "sold portion" of our land and our remaining property. The final sale of the property is contingent upon the City's boundary change approval and execution. Our architects, PARADIGM 3 ARCHITECTURE, are currently in the process of meeting with our contractor Jeremiah Wendell of Summit Builders Group; and our Liturgical Consultant, Ken Griesemer, to determine the estimated costs of each portion of the renovation and construction.

When all the necessary information is available we will schedule a FULL PARISH GATHERING (hopefully before mid-May) to review project plans, costs, expectations and our WAY FORWARD.



Sunday, March 31, 2024 He Has Risen!



Today's readings: Acts 10:34a, 37–43; Psalm 118:1–2, 16–17, 22–23; Colossians 3:1–4; John 20:1–9. The Lord has risen! Alleluia! Our rejoicing at Easter Time acknowledges that Christ's light has conquered darkness. Jesus came to do God's will; he paid the ultimate price, and now we proclaim with joy his resurrection. Our Lord prepared his disciples for his death and resurrection, telling them, "A little while, and you will no longer see me, and again a little while, and you will see me" (John 16:16). Jesus' rising from the dead should have come as no surprise to the disciples, yet they were surprised. As today's Gospel proclaims, "They did not yet understand the scripture that he had to rise from the dead." Even though we understand, we still need to be open

to seeing with the eyes of our hearts so that we can embrace the resurrected Christ.

After the forty days of penitence of Lent, we celebrate the light defeating the darkness for fifty days. During Easter Time, we are invited to meditate on how our actions allow us to be light for others. How do you aid others to dispel the darkness surrounding them? Do you carry the message that Jesus is alive? Are you willing to shout it? When we share the light of Christ that permeates our lives, we show appreciation for the faith that we have been given. Through Jesus Christ, God has fulfilled his promise and given us eternal life. Let us not be afraid to rejoice in the new life we have been given.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 1

Trust

This week the Gospel shows Jesus encountering his disciples in varied settings. As we pray with these readings, we might see ourselves reflected in the encounters. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary were fearful yet overjoyed upon seeing the empty tomb. How many of us have been stopped by our fears? These women trusted what the angel told them about our Lord. When we allow fear to overcome and paralyze us, problems are created. When afraid, seek the help of God, who has given you new life. *Today's readings: Acts 2:14, 22–33; Psalm 16:1–2a, 5, 7–8, 9–10, 11; Matthew 28:8–15.*

Tuesday, April 2 Conversion

Many of Jesus' followers are like Mary of Magdala and do not recognize the risen Lord. They continue to seek the Jesus they had known before he fulfilled his mission. To recognize the resurrected Jesus, we ought to rely on the eyes of our hearts, which are filled with faith and trust in the Lord. Allow your heart to have a true conversion leading God to dwell within you. *Today's readings: Acts 2:36–41; Psalm 33:4–5, 18–19, 20, 22; John 20:11–18.*

Wednesday, April 3 Bread of Life

Imagine that, as one of the apostles, you followed Jesus and broke bread with him just before his death. Then he was nowhere to be found, or so you think. After Jesus' death, the disciples began to feel alone and disillusioned. When have you had an encounter with someone and realized it had been Jesus? At Mass, Jesus becomes the Bread of Life for us. He has not abandoned us; he remains within us, offering spiritual sustenance. *Today's readings: Acts 3:1–10; Psalm 105:1–2, 3–4, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:13–35.*

Thursday, April 4 Agents of Peace

While the disciples spoke of how Jesus had become known to them in the breaking of the bread, he appeared, saying, "Peace be with you." Rather than being overjoyed, the disciples were scared. Jesus had to show them his wounds for them to believe it was he who had returned. Reflecting on this scene, consider whether you are at peace. Do you bring peace to others? Is there someone with a restless heart who needs your offering of peace? *Today's readings: Acts 3:11–26; Psalm 8:2ab, 5, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 24:35–48.*

Friday, April 5 Moving Forward

Jesus' followers have gone back to their old lives. Many people do the same today. After we experience a genuine encounter with Christ, it can be easy to return to our former ways. The harder path is to continue to move forward in the faith journey. As easy and as comfortable as our old life might have been, Christ calls us to a new life in which we surrender ourselves to God. *Today's readings: Acts 4:1–22; Psalm 118:1–2, 4, 22–24, 25–27a; John 21:1–14.*


Saturday, April 6 Is It Really He?

At the end of this first week of Easter, consider how you allowed yourself to be transformed. When have you recognized the presence of Jesus in your faith journey and opened yourself to change? Are there times that Jesus could rebuke you for your unbelief and hardness of heart, as he rebuked the apostles? As you read of the encounters Jesus had throughout his glorious day of resurrection, ponder how you have been the living Christ for others. Take to heart the message of light and hope brought about through the resurrection. *Today's readings: Acts 4:13–21; Psalm 118:24; Mark 16:9–15.*

Sunday, April 7, 2024 Ever Merciful



Today's readings: Acts 4:32–35; Psalm 118:2–4, 13–15, 22–24; 1 John 5:1–6; John 20:19–31. On this Second Sunday of Easter, the Church also celebrates the Sunday of Divine Mercy. The readings today reveal some of the many facets of God's mercy. The psalm proclaims that "his mercy endures forever," and in the Gospel, Jesus enacts that mercy as he greets the disciples in peace. In a loving manner, Jesus helps the group of disciples overcome doubt about the resurrection. Though his followers do not recognize him, he is gentle, beginning both visits with the greeting, "Peace be with you."

During the homily on the canonization of St. Faustina, Pope John Paul II declared that the Second Sunday of Easter would be called Divine Mercy Sunday. St. Faustina had shared her visions of Jesus appearing to her dressed in a white garment and with rays of light emanating from his heart. Jesus asked her to share the word of his mercy for a day to celebrate his mercy. St. Faustina trusted her vision.

The disciples to whom Jesus first appeared and whom he showed his wounds also trusted the man standing before them. At the sight of Jesus, these followers surrendered themselves completely to God. Think about your first encounter with Jesus. What was that moment like for you? How has your relationship changed over the stages of your life? Have others come to know Christ through your belief?



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 8 Say Yes!

God loved the world so much that he sent his only Son and chose Mary as his mother. Though Mary was a young girl, she did not waver in her response to God, replying to the angel, "May it be done to me according to your word." How hard is it for you to say yes to God? Do you need to practice an affirmative response to God? As we continue to celebrate Easter, pause for a moment to acknowledge the opportunities in your life to say yes to God's will. *Today's readings: Isaiah 7:10–14*, 8–10; *Psalm 40:7–8a*, 8b–9, 10, 11; Hebrews 10:4–10; Luke 1:26–38.

Tuesday, April 9 Invitation to Give

Imagine being told you need to rid yourself of all your possessions and give them to those in need. Many saints eschewed lavish lives and gave their wealth to the poor. These men and women stood in solidarity with those in need. God invites us to be in relationship with both him and others. Just as Jesus emptied himself for us, we must empty ourselves in service to others. How can you empty yourself for members of your community? *Today's readings: Acts 4:32–37; Psalm 93:1ab, 1cd–2, 5; John 3:7b–15.*

Wednesday, April 10 Forgiving Yourself

Not only does God hear the cry of the poor, as the psalm proclaims, but he sent his Son so that all who believe might have eternal life. It is especially heartening to hear that "God did not send his Son into the world to condemn." Pray to God that he might help you forgive yourself for shortcomings. Should you not show yourself the same forgiveness that God shows you? *Today's readings: Acts 5:7–26; Psalm 34:2–3, 4–5, 6–7, 8–9; John 3:16–21.*

Thursday, April 11 Power to Speak

"We must obey God rather than men," Peter tells his persecutors in today's reading from Acts. On this Memorial of St. Stanislaus, the Church honors a bishop who was not afraid to speak out against the evil in the king's deeds. As a Christian, are you committed to the work of fighting injustice and asserting the dignity of all people? Are you ready to be pointed out because you speak the truth? Pray to God that, through the power of the Holy Spirit, you are bestowed with strength and courage to denounce injustice and suffering. Today's readings: Acts 5:27–33; Psalm 34:2, 9, 17–18, 19–20; John 3:31–36.

Friday, April 12 Trust in God

Have you ever discovered that you were "fighting against God," as today's first reading cautions? Why is it so hard for you to trust in God and let something be? After all, God will more than provide for our needs just as Jesus did when he multiplied the loaves and fish for the people who came to him. Humbly ask God to bestow upon you a gentle heart that listens to his Word and is open to his will. *Today's readings:* Acts 5:34–42; Psalm 27:1, 4, 13–14; John 6:1–15.

Saturday, April 13 Surrender


