The Light of the World


Living Faith at Home, Sharing faith with others, Welcoming friends and neighbors to faith alive.

The Last Rite of the Church for the dying is Holy Communion.
The Sacrament of the Lord's Body and Blood
can be administered during the dying process.
When death already occurs the Prayers for the Dead are prayed.
Always remember to be in dialogue with the parish during these times.
At the time of death contact the parish as soon as possible.

Prior to making any funeral arrangements please be in dialogue with the parish.

When cremation is chosen, it ordinarily follows the funeral mass.



Children ages 3-10 are invited to participate in Children's Liturgy of the Word during the 10 am Mass. They are dismissed at the beginning of the liturgy of the word. We gather in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel to hear the readings and Gospel from the Children's Lectionary. A reflection on the Gospel is given at their level of understanding, followed by prayers of the faithful (during which pets and grandparents receive much attention). Children return to the main assembly during the offertory procession. Parents and/or older siblings are invited to accompany young children if desired.

Sticky Bun Recipe

Begin this recipe the night before. Great for Easter!

2 lbs. frozen rolls 1/2 c. butter (1 stick)

1 c. brown sugar 1 t. cinnamon

2 T. milk 2 small boxes (3.4 oz) vanilla 1/2 c. chopped nuts COOK & SERVE pudding mix

Place 24 pieces of frozen dough in a greased 13x9" pan. In a saucepan, combine the remaining ingredients and cook over low heat until butter is melted and sauce is warmed through and well combined. Pour sauce over dough. Cover with greased plastic wrap and let rise in the refrigerator overnight. In morning, take pan out while oven preheats to 350F. Bake 20-25 min. until golden brown. Immediately flip hot buns over serving platter with care. Serve warm.

Outreach



Introducing the Outreach Team

In October, the Whole Parish Faith Formation session highlighted Casey Dunning, Executive Director of the Missoula Interfaith Collaborative. During that session, all were invited to indicate an interest in one or more of the three main initiatives of MIC. In the weeks following, several parishioners have come together with S. Mary Jo Quinn, staff coordinator, to form the parish Outreach/Social Concerns Core Team. This team is entrusted with the ongoing oversight of our parish participation in and support of MIC

and the many other outreach ministries in which Blessed Trinity and Spirit of Christ Mission are engaged. One of our first endeavors is to help all parishioners learn more about the three principal initiatives of MIC: Family Promise, Housing Advocates Network (HAN), and Missoula Works (including the Get It Done crew and Ventures). The following article is the first in a continuing series of reflections by parishioners in the efforts of MIC.



The Joys of Family Promise

In this season of Lent, we are called upon to pray, give alms and fast. The Family Promise program at the Meadowlark on South 3rd St West has provided me many opportunities to do two of those things, and a different take on the third. Family Promise makes use of a lot of volunteers. They provide shelter for families in a difficult spot, a nutritious dinner every weekday, support to help families find

housing, activities for the children, and other services. As a retired person, I have found time to help serve dinner and other activities. This is a really well-run program, very worthy of support.

But what do I get out of it? Working with other volunteers has helped me expand contacts with other really goodhearted, amazing people from different churches. There is lots of time to chat while preparing food, serving, and cleaning up. Every person coming through the line for dinner gets a prayer, as do the other volunteers. Kind words, smiles, words of appreciation, the sharing of bad (or was that Dad?) jokes, the satisfaction of a job well done, all add to the good feeling at the end of the evening. Please join me in serving at Family Promise.

As the good St Francis of Assisi observed, "Preach the Gospel at all times. If necessary, use words."





THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT



Journey With Me

Lord God, fill my heart with love, so that I can see you in others and recognize them as the temples in which you reside on earth. May your spirit guide my every step.

In my struggles, give me strength and courage so that I will be steadfast in faith as I continue my journey. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Sunday, March 3, 2024 Renewed Temples

Today's readings: Exodus 20:1–17; Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 11; 1 Corinthians 1:22–25; John 2:13–25. Lent is a time for interior and exterior cleansing. Jesus was outraged when he saw what was taking place in the temple. The moneychangers failed to show reverence for the house of God when they used it as a marketplace. While some could not understand Jesus' overturning of the moneychangers' tables, the disciples recalled the words of Scripture, "Zeal for your house will consume me." Jesus' reaction to the sales in the temple make it apparent that such zeal was missing from others.

In baptism, we become a temple of the Holy Spirit. Our consideration of Christ's care for the temple in Jerusalem is an opportunity to reflect on how we care for all human beings, who are made in the image and likeness of God. Do we treat them with the dignity that a child of God deserves, remembering each person is sacred?

Just as you show concern for others, you need to care for yourself. How do you care for your interior life? Do you seek reconciliation with God through the sacrament of penance? Do you take to heart that God's mercy is for you as well as for others? In the remaining weeks of Lent, be especially attentive to the words of the penitential act. During this part of the Mass, the faithful may pray the Confiteor, after which the priest calls on God's mercy. The other option is for the faithful to pray the Kyrie, saying, "Lord, have mercy / Christ have mercy" to the priest's invocations. Seeking mercy, our zeal for God is apparent.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, March 4 Faith and Humility

When Jesus is asked to perform signs in his hometown as he did in other places, he refuses, saying, "No prophet is accepted in his own native place." Jesus accepted that his former neighbors would not believe and so did not seek to prove himself. Sometimes we face humbling situations; we, too, do not need to prove ourselves. It is necessary only to accept that all we have is by the grace of God. *Today's readings: 2 Kings 5:1–15ab; Psalm 42:2–3; 43: 3–4; Luke 4:24–30.*

Tuesday, March 5 Love and Kindness

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells Peter that he must forgive another "not seven times but seventy-seven times." From that instruction, we may ascertain that we are to forgive over and over again. Such forgiveness is an act of kindness, one which any of us would hope to receive after our own transgression. When wronged, we have an opportunity to create enmity or to nurture love. Who needs your forgiveness? From whom do you need to request forgiveness? *Today's readings: Daniel 3:25, 34–43; Psalm 25:4–5ab, 6, 7bc, 8–9; Matthew 18:21–35.*

Wednesday, March 6 Praise the Lord

"Praise the Lord, Jerusalem," we sing today in the refrain for Psalm 147. In recognizing all that God has done, the psalm is a reminder that prayers of praise should be part of our prayer life. During these remaining weeks of Lent, schedule a time at the end of the day to recall the ways that God has blessed you. Compose your own prayer of praise and thanksgiving. You might include today's refrain in your prayer. *Today's readings: Deuteronomy 4:1, 5–9; Psalm 147:12–13, 15–16, 19–20; Matthew 5:17–19.*

Thursday, March 7 Soften Your Hearts

In the reading from Jeremiah, the Lord speaks of how his people have ignored his voice and his commands. The Lord tells the prophets: "But they obeyed not, nor did they pay heed. They walked in the hardness of their hearts." Hardened hearts are still noticed, as people are concerned with many things. Efforts can be made to soften hearts. Today, tell someone that God loves him or her, and that you do too. Do not expect a response. *Today's readings: Jeremiah 7:23–28; Psalm 95:1–2, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 11:14–23.*

Friday, March 8 Listen with Your Heart

Sometimes we ask questions when we already know the answer. Are we hoping for a different answer from what we know is from God? The third week of Lent is winding down. Have you committed to a process of transformation? Have you set aside time for discernment and reflection? As the Lenten season continues, take courage and listen with your heart. *Today's readings: Hosea 14:2–10; Psalm 81:6c–8a, 8bc–9, 10–11ab, 14, 17; Mark 12:28–34.*

Saturday, March 9 Spring Cleaning

The phrase "Practice makes perfect" is kept in mind while seeking to improve performance. In today's readings, we hear that God desires our love and mercy, not our sacrifice. Each season of the liturgical year is a new opportunity to grow in our love for God and others and to learn to be generous with our mercy. Lent's emphasis on penitence and baptism is an invitation to discard what keeps us from God and bring to the fore those practices that conform us to the promises of our baptism. Some might call this an interior spring cleaning. *Today's readings: Hosea 6:1–6; Psalm 51:3–4, 18–19, 20–21ab; Luke 18:9–14.*
