

Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near. Have no anxiety at all,

(each person at table may wish to mention something for which they are thankful, or a family member may prepare a special prayer of thanks to be said now.)

LET EACH OF US MENTION ALOUD OR SILENTLY IN OUR HEARTS WHAT WE ARE THANKFUL FOR THIS DAY:

After each person speaks all say together: WE THANK YOU, LORD:

For all that we have spoken and for all that we keep in our hearts, accept our thanksgiving on this day.

We pray and give thanks through Jesus Christ our Lord. AMEN



ALL MAY THEN JOIN IN SINGING AN ALLELUIA, or a verse from HOLY GOD WE PRAISE THY NAME, or NOW THANK WE ALL OUR GOD

Now thank we all our God, With heart and hands and voices, Who wondrous things has done, In whom his world rejoices; Who from our mother's arms Has blessed us on our way With countless gifts of love, And still is ours today.

### **ADVENT: WE WAIT IN JOYFUL HOPE**

merican culture is fast paced and always on the move. If there is one thing that our society detests, it is when we have to wait for something. With all our modern technology, we find that being patient is a forced requirement even in our high-tech world of speedy responses. We wait in line at the supermarket, the bank and at any government office. On the phone, we are left on hold "...until the next customer service representative is available." Traffic lights and traffic jams take a serious toll on time that could be well spent elsewhere. Even hospital emergency rooms are places of long and sometimes painful periods of waiting. With all of these unpleasant minutes and hours lost forever to waiting, one has to wonder why the Church would dedicate Advent, an entire liturgical season of the Church, to waiting.

Of course, not all periods of waiting are filled with tension and stress. Some are actually joy-filled and even exciting, like the waiting of a child who cannot get to sleep on Christmas Eve or the feeling of elation that comes when one is expecting to see a spouse returning safely from a long trip overseas. Not only are we watching the clock or looking at the window in advance of their arrival, but special preparations are usually made as well. The home is cleaned and favorite foods are prepared all in anticipation of something wonderful. This is the kind of waiting that the Church means when it speaks of waiting for the Lord during the season of Advent.

When we think of Advent, we tend to imagine the events prior to the birth of Christ, but the prayers and scripture readings used at the beginning of the Advent season speak of waiting for a future event, not looking back at a previous one. They focus present day listeners on Christ's second coming which is closely linked to the end of the world. In some cases these predictions sound quite ominous: "There will be signs in the sun, the moon and the stars...People will die of fright in anticipation of what is coming upon the world." (See Luke 21: 25-28, First Sunday of Advent, Year C).

Advent is not meant to be a season of fear regarding the end of the world. Indeed, the *General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar* state that Advent "...has a twofold character: as a season to prepare for Christmas when Christ's first coming to us is remembered; as a season when that remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ's second coming at the end of time. Advent is thus a season of devout and joyful expectation." General Instruction on Liturgical Year #39

Additionally, we should not forget the words of the priest spoken at every Mass after the Lord's Prayer, "...and protect us from all anxiety as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ."

Other prayers used during the season of Advent remind us that we ourselves are people who live in expectation of the Messiah's second coming. The opening prayer for the First Sunday of Advent prays that Christ "may find an eager welcome at his coming." On the Third Sunday of Advent we pray: "The earth rejoices in hope of the savior's coming and looks forward with longing to his return at the end of time." The Roman Missal

Waiting for the second coming does not mean that we are prophets of doom claiming the world is soon to end. Rather, it means that we are people who joyfully watch for the return of one whose presence we long for. We prepare our hearts, our homes and our lives for the

coming of the Son of Man. Therefore, we live every day in imitation of Christ so that we will always be ready to meet the Lord whether he comes to us in the face of a stranger in need or riding on a cloud with power and great glory.

(our lectionary is a three year cycle-year A, B, & C). For most of the Sundays of the year 2026 we will hear the GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

n the ancient Christian Tradition **Matthew** is symbolized by a **HUMAN ANGEL** because his Gospel begins by telling the human ancestory of Jesus.

(**Mark** is the **LION** because his gospel begins in the wilderness; **Luke** is the Ox because this gospel begins with the temple, the place of sacrifice, and then soon tells of the birth in the place where farm animals lived. **John** is the **EAGLE** for his gospel begins "In the beginning," far above all.)

# The year of the Gospel of Matthew

Beginning next SUNDAY, the First Sunday of Advent, the Church begins to proclaim the Gospel of Matthew.

he first gospel starts with "a genealogy of Jesus Christ, son of David, son of Abraham." With this opening the evangelist prepares us for this Jesus who will be the fulfillment of major figures of the Hebrew scriptures.

Archeologists and textual experts usually date the writing of the Gospel of Matthew to around 80 CE. One piece of evidence for the dating of this gospel is that it contains nearly all of the Gospel of Mark. From this we know that it was composed after 70 CE (near the time when Mark was written). In addition to having Mark as a source, the Gospel of Matthew shares a large chunk of material with Luke, material that appears neither in Mark or in John. From this we assume that there was another source for Matthew, one that he and the writer of Luke used. Matthew also had his own information about Jesus that the other evangelists did not.

The Gospel of Matthew is unique in its five-part structure: after the introduction (which contains the stories of the annunciation to Joseph [not Mary, as in Luke] of Jesus' birth, his birth and manifestation to the magi [not shepherds, as in Luke], each part contains a long speech by Jesus followed by actions that Jesus performs. Part one is the Sermon on the Mount (chapters 5–7); part two prepares the disciples for their missionary journeys (10); part three is filled with parables (13); part four deals with church order (18); and the fifth part concerns the end of the world (24–25). Scholars assume that the evangelist adopted this structure from the Pentateuch, the first five books of the Bible. This is a big clue about the portrait of Jesus in this gospel.

Many of the people in the church for which the Gospel of Matthew was written were Jews. One of the main purposes of this gospel was to provide consolation to those who wrestled with the compatibility of the Jewish heritage and their faith in Jesus. For this reason we find references to patriarchs of ancient Israel from the very first verse. A genealogy filled with Jewish ancestors begins the text, and the evangelist fills the narrative with quotations from the Hebrew scriptures. All of this seeks to reassure the hearers that Jesus of Nazareth was indeed the Messiah anticipated in the older faith.

The Gospel of Matthew is proclaimed throughout Year A, in the years, 2023, 2026 and so on. In art, the evangelist Matthew is portrayed with an angel by his side. The feast of Saint Matthew is September 21.

# STATEMENT FROM THE UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS ON IMMIGRATION



From the Plenary Assembly in Baltimore - November 12, 2025

As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of God-given human dignity.

Catholic teaching exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaningful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will work together.

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks. The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (*Genesis 1:27*). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (*Zechariah 7:10*). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poor for our sake (*2 Corinthians 8:9*), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (*Luke 10:30–37*), and we see the One who is found in the least of these (*Matthew 25*). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (*John 13:34*).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (*cf. 1 Corinthians* 12:26). You are not alone!


We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious, and lay faithful already accompany and assist immigrants in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts.

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform.

As disciples of the Lord, we remain men and women of hope, and hope does not disappoint! (cf. Romans 5:5)

May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and loving care and draw us ever closer to the heart of Christ.




