REFLECTION DURING THE HOMILY

Introducing the Blessed Trinity Capital Campaign 2020



My husband David and I are new to both Missoula and Blessed Trinity. We retired here from San Diego, CA, 2 ½ years ago. As I listened to the thoughtful sharing by Gary Weisbrich and Joe Licitra, I noticed how much in common our experiences were despite coming to Blessed Trinity at very different times. What struck David and I from the very first moment that we walked through the doors of Blessed Trinity was how very genuinely warm and welcoming everyone was. From Pat Wegner and Marge Nordin who greeted us at the door to Father Ed who took the time before Mass to introduce himself and ask about our first visit to the church while on vacation here in Missoula.

Having been active members of our former parish for over 40 years, we knew finding a new church was going to be a challenge. But after the warm and caring way in which we were treated here that day, we knew we had found a new home. I remember that we spontaneously looked at each other, smiled, and said "This is it." This feeling of becoming part of a family is what drew us to Blessed Trinity without reservation. And this is also why I feel it is important to take an active part in this new growth phase of our parish.

Whether you are a lifelong Catholic like myself or are new to the faith, each of us has been a witness to the way faithful parishioners of other churches have answered the call to create a place of worship for their community and visitors to gather and show their love of Christ. Their communal sacrifice made it possible for all who came to them to have a haven, a place where no one is a stranger, where everyone could concretely experience the universal feeling of a family coming together to worship our Lord as one.
